













THE AGRICULTURE SECTOR BENEFITS THE ENTIRE COUNTY

With the Mississippi River forming its western border and the Wisconsin River its southern, Crawford County is a region of hills and valleys, making it ideal for small farms and rotational grazing. About a third of the county's beef and dairy farms practice rotational grazing, giving farmers an economic edge and helping conserve the area's highly erodible soil. Milk production remains a mainstay, but the county also has many grain farms and is home to largescale orchards. It's known for organic and pasture-raised products, including pork, poultry and goat meat. Logging is a major economic force in this heavily forested county, as are tourism, hunting and fishing.
