




## AGRICULTURE WORKS HARD FOR

Washburn County is characterized by many diversified farms producing, dairy products, beef, turkey, bison, sheep hogs, corn, soybeans, small grains and forage crops. There are also an increasing number of smaller organic and fresh fruit and vegetable farms and agro-tourism operations. Washburn County is also home to one of the largest beef jerky processors in the U.S. and the Spooner Agriculture Research Station, operated by the University of Wisconsin-Madison. This diversity along with the county's abundant lakes and forest land are very attractive and adds a substantial value to the quality of life to residents and tourists alike.
