how people think/feel/act

3 Things to Know About Framing


- 1. We have multiple ways of reasoning about the information we receive.
- 2. Frames are choices about how information is presented.
- 3. Research can help us determine which framing strategies are most effective.



"Rent burden" is defined as spending 30 percent or more of pretax income on housing. In 2015, at least 38% of Americans were rent-burdened, compared with 21% in 2001.



The real estate market has been booming for the last few years.
