

A program to get all Americans online by funding partnerships between states or territories, communities, and stakeholders to build infrastructure where we need it and increase adoption of high-speed internet.

#### Entities eligible to apply for this program include:

- All 50 States
- The District of Columbia and Puerto Rico
- Other Territories: U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands




## 2023: The Year of Planning

- Five-Year Action Plan due: August 28, 2023
- Draft Plan out for comment: mid-Summer 2023
- February through June: Local Planning, Technical Assistance, Outreach Events

Technical assistance and

planning is an <u>ongoing effort</u> and does not end August 28.



## What goes into the Five-Year Action Plan?

- Details of the existing broadband program, including its activities, any previous entity-wide plans or goals for availability of broadband, and any prior experience awarding broadband deployment grants Current funding available for broadband deployment or other 9 related activities and the sources of that funding, including additional funds that may be pursued but are not yet in hand Existing efforts funded by the federal government or an Eligible (10) Entity within the jurisdiction of the Eligible Entity to deploy broadband and close the digital divide. Current employees who will assist in implementing and (11) administering the BEAD Program and their duties, as well as any existing contracted support, and any planned expansion Known or potential obstacles or barriers to implementation and 5 12 corresponding plans to address them. An asset inventory that catalogues broadband adoption, affordability, equity, access, and deployment activities and provides details regarding any relevant partners Details of its external engagement process, demonstrating collaboration with local, regional, and Tribal / Native entities
  - 8 Available federal, Eligible Entity, or local broadband availability and adoption data
  - Local broadband service needs and gaps, including un- or underserved locations and CAIs without gigabit service, and/or any plans to make determinations where availability is unclear
  - A comprehensive, high-level plan for providing universal, reliable, affordable, high-speed broadband service throughout the jurisdiction
    - Digital equity and inclusion needs, goals, and strategies, including ways it plans to utilize BEAD funding, Digital Equity Act funding and/or other funding in concert
  - 2 Alignment of the Five-Year Action Plan with **other existing and planned priorities**, incl. economic development, telehealth, workforce development, related connectivity priorities
  - 13 Technical assistance and additional capacity needed for successful implementation of the BEAD Program



## How are we spending our time planning?

Provide the second state of the second stat



to request ≤\$5M Initial Planning Funds

An Eligible Entity that receives Initial Planning Funds must submit a Five-Year Action Example uses for Initial Planning Funds for planning and predeployment activities

- Establishing capacity in office of Eligible Entity running program
- Research and data collection
- Development of a preliminary budget for pre-planning activities
- Publications, outreach & communication support
- Providing technical assistance to potential subgrantees
- Training for employees (e.g., Eligible Entity, stakeholders, etc.)
- Conducting surveys of unserved, underserved, and underrepresented communities
- Local coordination, including capacity building



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# BEAD Local Planning Grant Program

#### • What?

- \$1,500,000 distributed equally among counties and Tribes.
- 10% bonus for regional collaboration
  - Regional Economic Development Organization (REDO)
  - Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council
- How?
  - Decision made by County/Tribe
  - Forthcoming "letter of intent"
  - Opt in by March 7, 2023 at 1:30p.m.


# Survey and mapping tool

#### What should local and Tribal governments do now?

- 1) <u>Start the conversation</u>: Who within your county or Tribe will lead this planning effort? Will you collaborate with a REDO/GLITC?
- 2) <u>Opt in:</u> Sign the letter of intent by March 7.
- **3)** <u>**Plan to plan:**</u> How will your planning team convene and coordinate? How will you spend funding?
- 4) <u>Leverage technical assistance</u>: Request resources & establish regular engagement with Extension and the Office of Rural Prosperity
- 5) <u>Towns, cities, villages, other partners:</u> Connect to your planning entity
