Identified a need to set a baseline for Economic Development work going forward Identified a need to establish PEC as a stronger player in Economic Development in the area

Identified a need to understand the relationship between Energy and Economic Development Rollout \subseteq allenges Some communities did not view us as partners and were unwilling to participate.

Some communities did not have capacity to participate, and we did not have networks in place to support them.

Some businesses were initially reluctant to participate and did not understand the role of the co-op in Economic Development.

Immediate Benefits







Built relationships with several dozen large C&I Members

Identified holes in program and community relationships

Extended the timeline of co-op awareness of member expansions – critical given supply chain challenges

Long Term Benefits

More partners recognize the role of the co-op in Economic Development More partners understand how to support the co-op as we support local development Data to support long term Economic Development Strategic Goals – Automation, Housing, Electric Vehicles, Energy Storage

What to do Differently

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Take more time to understand and build community support and relationships at a granular level. Enlist existing co-op volunteers into the program (i.e. MAC members at PEC). 3

Work more closely with Engineers to shape questions and create a specific red flag pathway for them. Pre-program some support materials for when respondents ask for information offered in the questionnaire.
